## **FACILITIES**

Over the past year, we have dedicated significant effort to evaluating the condition of our facilities. It has become increasingly clear that we face substantial challenges just to maintain functionality due to the significant age of our buildings.

When comparing our facilities to other school districts in the region, it is evident that we are operating with some of the oldest buildings. For context, the elementary school recently replaced in Jordan was seven years newer than our Chatfield Elementary School. Moreover, much of the facility housing our Agriscience courses, woods courses, SOAR program, and performing arts space dates all the way back to 1929.

To better understand our needs, we partnered with a construction management company to conduct a thorough evaluation of our facilities. Their assessment revealed that maintaining and keeping our current spaces functional would require an investment of nearly \$50 million in repairs and maintenance over the coming years.

In addition to these maintenance needs, we also face several critical facility gaps compared to neighboring districts:

- Security Concerns: At the secondary level, students must frequently transition between the main building and separate spaces, which creates security vulnerabilities. Additionally, our elementary schools lack secure entrances where all visitors must pass through a staffed office. While we currently use a buzzer system to monitor visitors, this is not an ideal solution for ensuring the safety of our students and staff.
- Auditorium: We are the only district in the region without a fully functioning, traditional auditorium.





- Gymnasium Space: Our gym facilities are insufficient to meet the demands of our programs. The current space is fully utilized. with practices scheduled as early as 6 a.m. and extending late into the evening. Despite these efforts. overcrowding and scheduling remain conflicts persistent challenges.
- Career & Technical Ed (CTE): Our expanding CTE programs need significant updates to align with modern workforce demands and adequately prepare students for future careers.

Taking all these factors into consideration, we are developing a facility plan designed to address these challenges and set our district up for success over the next 20+ years. Our goal is simple: to ensure that we have facilities and spaces comparable to those of other districts in the region—nothing more, nothing less.

## CONSTRUCTION TRADES COURSE

We are continually working to create hands-on learning opportunities for our students. This year, our Construction Trades class has been building a 15' x 56' shed at our softball complex. The project was made possible thanks to the support of the Softball Association. which secured donations and funding for materials. To minimize costs and maximize learning, our students took on the construction of the shed.

This project also provided an opportunity to partner with the city,



specifically with, Building Inspector, Jim Tiegs. Jim worked closely with our students to explain building codes and the rationale behind different regulations for various structures. His guidance helped make this an invaluable experience.

Overall, this has been a fantastic opportunity for our students to apply real-world skills. We are excited to explore more ways to expand these kinds of authentic, hands-on learning experiences, especially in the Career and Technical Education (CTE) field.
